Baltasar Garzon, the man for justice

The name Baltasar Garzon may not ring a bell in many minds - at least, not yet, but human right activists around the world these days are literally worshipping the ground on which this simple Spanish magistrate is treading. It is thanks to him that the British have clamped handcuffs on the 83 year old, former Chilean dictator, Augusto Pinochet, the man who ruled Chile from 1973 to 1990 like his private property. He once boasted that "Not a loaf stirs in this country [i.e. Chile] unless I stir it', and thousands who dared simply "disappeared" under horrible conditions.

Recovering from surgery in a London hospital, Pinochet had what an American columnist, Richar Cohen, calls a "rude awakening" when he was told that not even the pompous title of Senator for life, which he had conferred on himself when he left power, could provide him immunity from prosecution in Britain.

His arrest is, no doubt sending alarm bells *ringing* in the minds of the still numerous tinpot dictators in Latin America, Africa and elsewhere around the world. According to Chen, "Baltasar Garzon has set off a wonderful process - a pioneering effort to apply International law to tyrants." Accountability is now the word. The Bishops of Cameroon instituted the First Friday of each month as a day **of** prayer for numerous victims of assassination in our land whose killers are, for the most part, still at large.

But with Pinochet's arrest, the writing is on the wall for all violators of human rights any where in the world. Those of them who, like Pinochet, like to make short, private visits abroad could, on the instructions of a mere magistrate, be whisked away in handcuffs right at the airport terminal, or from the luxury of their hotel rooms, to answer for their violation of the rights of their citizens. Baltasar Garzon has set the pace. We salute him on behalf of suffering humanity the world over.
